### Swimming

The park has an Olympic-size swimming pool and a children's wading pool. The pool is open Memorial Day Weekend until early August.

### Group Camp

The group camp is available to scout groups and other non-profits. It is open April 1 to October 31 and accommodates approximately 30 tents. There is limited parking. To reserve, please call the park office.

The 1.45 mile paved bike trail is open to hikers. No bike rentals are available.

### David Crockett State Park

The 1,319-acre park is located along the Little Shoal Creek, three miles from Lawrenceburg. The park offers tent and RV camping, a restaurant, and a swimming pool. Hiking, paddling on Lake Lindsey, fishing, and wildlife viewing are popular activities. There is also an aviary and museum.



### Historical Significance

Dedicated in 1959, the park honors one of Tennessee's most famous native sons. David Crockett was a pioneer, soldier, politician, and industrialist. He was born near the little town of Limestone in northeast Tennessee in 1786. In 1817, he moved to Lawrence County and served as a justice of the peace, a colonel of the militia, and state representative. Along the banks of Shoal Creek, in what is now his namesake park, he established a diversified industry consisting of a powder mill, a gristmill and a distillery. All three operations were washed away in a flood in September, 1821. Crockett died at the Alamo in 1836, while aiding the Texans in their fight for independence from Mexico.



### Cabins

There are seven LEED Certified, premium cabins with two bedrooms, two baths and a full kitchen. One bedroom has two queen beds, the master has a queen-size bed and the great room has a queen sleeper sofa. Each cabin is completely furnished and offers a covered patio. The cabins are available year-round, with a two-night minimum stay. There is a three night minimum stay during holidays. Reserve online or by calling the park.

### Restaurant

The restaurant seats up to 240 people and has wonderful views of Lake Lindsey. The restaurant is open seasonally, Wednesday through Sunday.



### Meeting Rooms

There are meeting rooms in the restaurant that are perfect for weddings, meetings, reunions and other events. The restaurant offers catering to groups of up to 250 people. For reservations or catering options, call 931-762-9541.

### Museum

The museum contains a replica of a gristmill and is open to the public free of charge from Memorial Day to Early August. Open weekends, beginning early August when staff is available. Please call the office for special arrangements.

### Fishing

Lake Lindsey, (40-acre), is known for catches of bass, crappie, Bluegill and catfish. Fish length and creel limits are posted. Row boats can be rented year-round. Bait and a Tennessee fishing license can be purchased from vendors near the park.

### Picnic Pavilions

Seven picnic pavilions are available for parties, company picnics or family reunions. The pavilions accommodate from 30 to 100 people. To reserve, call the park office.



### Boating

Fishing boats can be rented at Lake Lindsey during the summer and at the park office during off-season. You may also bring your own. No gas powered motors allowed. Paddleboards, canoes, kayaks and pedal boats are also available to rent during the summer.

### Camping

The park has two campgrounds with a total of 111 sites designated for campers. Campground 1 is near the park entrance with Shoal Creek passing along its boundaries. It has 51 sites with water and electric hookups and eight primitive sites. Campground 2 is a mile into the park and has water and electricity hookups. Each campground has bathhouses and a dump station. Reserve online or by calling the park.



### Hiking

There are approximately 10 miles of natural and paved hiking trails ranging from easy to moderate. Trail maps are available online. The trails offer scenic vistas of Shoal Creek and Crockett Falls, limestone bluffs, abundant wildlife and serene forest.

### Amphitheater

The amphitheater seats about 1,000 people and may be rented by calling the park office.
