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### FISHING

The Nolichucky River flows through the park and provides fishing opportunities for a variety of freshwater species. Smallmouth bass and catfish are common catches. Bank fishing and wade fishing are popular. Bait, tackle, and snacks can be purchased at the Camp Store. State fishing licenses can be purchased online or off-site.

### HIKING

Approximately five miles of trail range from easy to moderate, providing beautiful views and ample wildlife and wildflower viewing opportunities.

### CAMPING

The park has 83 sites consisting of 48 full hook-up sites with water, sewer, and 50-amp electrical service; 16 sites with water and 30 amps electrical hook-ups, and 13 primitive tent sites. Campfires are permitted only in designated fire rings or in above-ground fire stands equipped with screens and covers. The campground is near the scenic Nolichucky River. All sites can be reserved online.

### DIRECTIONS

From Knoxville on I-40 East: Follow signs for I-81. Take I-81 to Exit 23/Greeneville. Turn right onto Highway 11E/Greeneville. Follow signs to the park, approx. 28 miles from Exit 23.

From Bristol on I-81: Keep West to Exit 57A. Merge onto I-26 toward Johnson City. Take Exit 17/Boones Creek Road toward Jonesborough. Turn right onto Highway 11E/Greeneville. Follow signs to the park, approx. 32 miles from Exit 57A.

From Asheville on I-26: Keep North and take Exit 37/TN-107 towards Jonesborough. Turn left onto TN-107 at TN-81 intersection. Stay on TN-107 towards Tusculum. Turn right onto Highway 11E. Follow signs to the park, approx. 39 miles from Exit 37.

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## DAVID CROCKETT BIRTHPLACE STATE PARK

David Crockett Birthplace State Park is located at the confluence of the Nolichucky River and Limestone Creek in Greene County, Tennessee. This 105-acre park honors one of our nation's most famous individuals. It is home to an 18th-century outdoor homestead exhibit which showcases early settlement life. There is a museum dedicated to Crockett and a gift shop. Located nearby is a monument honoring David Crockett containing native stones donated from each of the 50 states. The park has a diversity of natural settings ranging from forested limestone bluffs to meadows and tree-lined streams, all providing exceptional bird and wildlife viewing opportunities.

## MUSEUM & GIFT SHOP

The David Crockett Birthplace Museum houses items common to life on the eastern frontier and portraits and documents relating to David Crockett. A small display of items from the Fes Parker Era (Mid 1950s) of David Crockett is also within the museum, along with T-shirts, mugs, books, and various other items for purchase. The museum and gift shop are open from 8:30 A.M. to 4:00 P.M., and closed one hour for lunch, seven days a week. Holidays may change the hours of operation.

## PLANNED PROGRAMS

The Crockett Days Celebration, held in August, celebrates the pioneer lifestyle while honoring David Crockett, and features living history exhibitions and re-enactors in period dress from the late 18th century. The Crockett Homestead is an outdoor exhibit where you can catch a glimpse into 18th-century frontier life. A Crockett Tour is offered once a month and weekly during Memorial Day to Labor Day. This park ranger-led paid program covers the settling of upper East Tennessee, the Crockett Family's involvement in the American Revolution War, and David Crockett's escapades from Greene County to the Alamo.

## HISTORICAL SIGNIFICANCE

Born in 1786, David Crockett epitomizes the strength and character vital to our nation's westward expansion during the pioneer era. With virtually no formal education, he rose from the depths of poverty to national fame and a seat in the United States Congress. His fame and popularity during his life were celebrated in books and plays. His death at the Alamo in 1836 marked the beginning of his legend. David Crockett Birthplace State Park is dedicated to the memory of this exceptional figure in our nation's history.
