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PADDLING

Kayaks and SUPs are available to rent daily, with the exception of garrison weekends and during special events. You are welcome to use the kayak launch if you are bringing your own canoe or kayak.

FORT LOUDOUN STATE HISTORIC PARK

is an 853-acre day-use park located on the shores of Tellico Lake. The park preserves the history of Fort Loudoun and the role it played in the French and Indian War. Built in 1756, the fort was one of the earliest British fortifications on the western frontier.

During the French and Indian War (1754-1763), the British Colony of South Carolina felt threatened by French activities in the Mississippi River Valley. To counter this threat, the Colony sent the Independent Company of South Carolina to construct and garrison what became Fort Loudoun. This move helped to ally the mighty Overhill Cherokee Nation in the fight against the French and guaranteed that trade would continue between the Cherokees and South Carolina. In the course of the fort's four-year existence between 1756 and 1760, relations between the British and the Cherokee nation broke down. In August 1760, the British surrendered Fort Loudoun to the Cherokee, and its garrison was attacked and taken hostage 15 miles from the fort.

The fort was reconstructed during the Great Depression. It was designated a National Historic Landmark in 1965.

HIKING

There are five miles of moderate trail that loop around the park. Trail maps are available at the park office, on the website, and on the mobile app.

GIFT SHOP

The visitors center holds a bookstore and gift shop. The merchandise reflects the colonial theme of Fort Loudoun.

PICNIC PAVILIONS

Fort Loudoun has thirty picnic sites with grills at each table. There is one pavilion that accommodates up to 50 people. Reservations can be made online or by calling the park. Restrooms are available in the picnic area.

FISHING

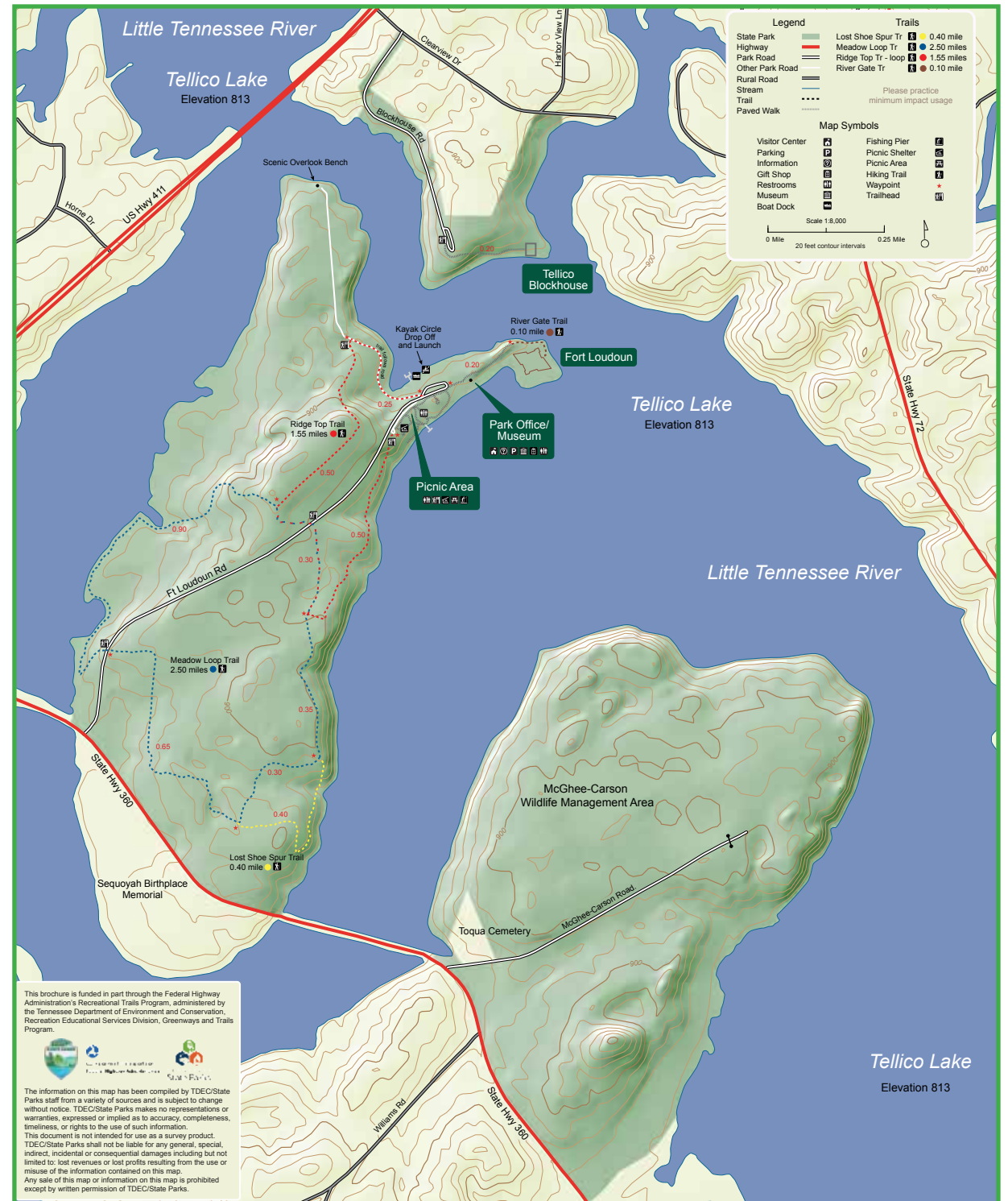
Fishing is available year-round from a 50-foot, accessible fishing pier that projects over Tellico Lake. A Tennessee fishing license is required.

PLANNED PROGRAMS

There are monthly interpretive programs that recreate the daily life of the original troops of Fort Loudoun. Programs are appropriate for all ages.

MUSEUM

The visitors center houses an exhibit area with artifacts recovered during an archeological dig of the fort site. Visitors can watch "The Fort Loudoun Story," an award-winning, 15-minute video on the history of the site in the auditorium. Hours for the visitors center are 8:00 A.M. to 4:30 P.M. daily.
